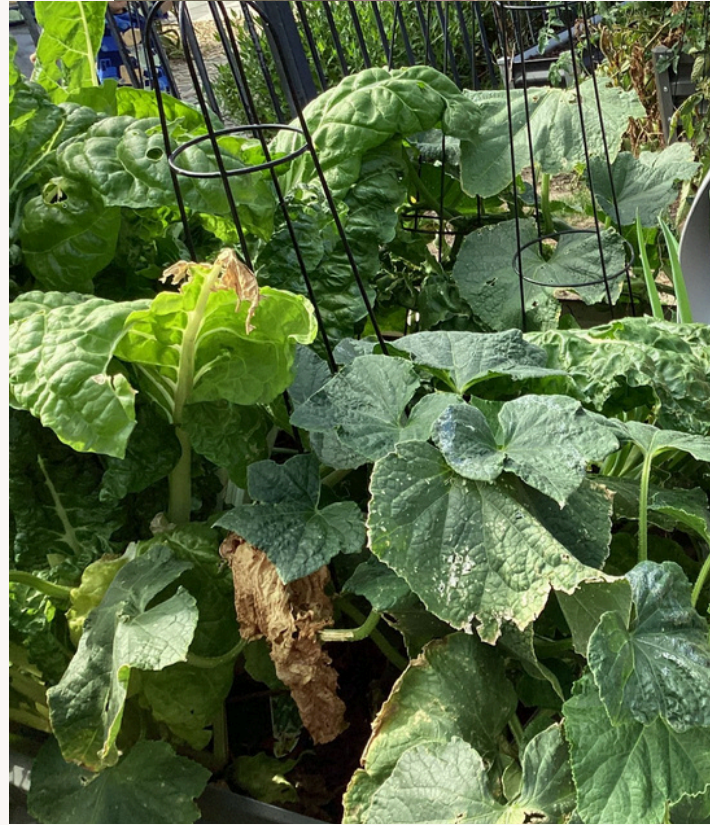
child safe standards

The Standards set out minimum requirements and outline the actions organisations must take to keep children and young people safe. They provide more clarity for organisations and are more consistent with Standards in the rest of Australia. The things organisations already do to keep children and young people safe will help them be compliant with the new Standards. What will be different? Although similar to Victoria's current Child Safe Standards, key changes include new requirements: • to involve families and communities in organisations' efforts to keep children and young people safe • for a greater focus on safety for Aboriginal children and young people • to manage the risk of child abuse in online environments • in relation to governance, systems and processes to keep children and young people safe.

Veggie Garden:

We are so pleased to announce that Mirram children will involve in planting this year as we are growing snow peas in our garden bed. Our children are super excited for this project. They show their great interest in gardening; it provides a wonderful opportunity to foster their development in a variety of ways. Gardening can be a rich, hands-on experience that supports physical, cognitive, social, and emotional growth. gardening is opportunity to nurture children's growth in many different areas. The sensory exploration, responsibility, patience, and connection to nature that gardening offers provide a solid foundation for their emotional, social, and cognitive development. We want to make this gardening experience become a joyful, educational, and deeply rewarding experience for children. They learn a lifelong love of nature, healthy habits, and a deeper understanding of the world around them.

Chinese fan dance:

The children were immediately intrigued by the vibrant colors and unique designs of the fans, and their natural curiosity led to delightful moments of discovery. We observed the children developing fine motor skills as they held the fans and practiced coordination in their movements. The experience also encouraged social interaction, as the children shared the fans, took turns, and giggled together, showing an early sense of cooperation. The bright colors and dynamic movements of the fans created a visually stimulating environment, supporting sensory development while allowing the children to explore artistic expression in a simple, hands-on way. Welcome to the Woolert room for 2025.

It's been such a super fun Term and The children have all settled in so well. We thank all the amazing educators who have worked in the room this term, particularly over the Jan school Holidays when Myself and Liza have been away. The children are in the routine of things and are really enjoying their time.

We can't wait for another 3 great terms with the Woolerts!!

This term, we were fortunate to have a special visit from Pallyan, the son of Murrundindi, the Elder of the Wurundjeri people. During their visit, Pallyan and his team presented a lesson focused on the Wurundjeri language and culture. We had the incredible opportunity to learn several important Indigenous words, which helped us connect with the rich heritage of the Wurundjeri people. Some of the words we learned included:

Wominjeka – Welcome

Gudjinna – Hello

Bunjil – Wedge-tailed eagle

Mirram – Kangaroo

Wooterang – Platypus

Wollert – Possum

Inga-Linga – Echidna

Babjin – Kookaburra



After familiarizing ourselves with the names of these animals, we were introduced to a puppet of each one, which made the experience even more engaging. The puppets helped bring the animals to life as we sang songs about each one, learning more about their significance in Wurundjeri culture.

To wrap up the lesson, we combined all of the songs we had learned, celebrating both the animals and the language. This experience not only taught us new words but also deepened our understanding of the Wurundjeri people's connection to nature and their rich cultural traditions.

Colour Monster and Emotional Literacy

This term we have started work on our Emotional Literacy learning, with a major focus on the book “the Colour Monster” By Anna Llenas.

This book looks at lots of different emotions and associates them with a colour. We have looked at things that Make the woolerts happy so far. Some of those responses include Their mummy and daddies, a hug, friends and breakfast. We will be continuing to explore more emotions in Term 2 and onwards.



BABAJIN NEWS

KINDNESS JAR

Kindness- we engaged in reading a book about Kind- This sparked conversations about what it means to be kind and each child shared something they have done which is kind. We created our own kindness jar; have a look in our room where the children placed a sticker inside the jar when they had done something kind and shared their kindness act. We will now extend this to make another jar as they share acts of kindness they have done in their home environment.



Pallyan excursion and incursion- Pallyan is the son of Wurundjeri elder, Murrindindi and he came into kinder and taught his language program. They are continuing to learn;

Wominjeka is welcome

They sang the 'We come together' song

Bunjil- Wedge-tailed eagle

Gudjinna (Good-gin-na) is hello

Mirram- kangaroo

Woterang- platypus

Inga- Linga is echidna

Noon-Gudjin (Noon-good-gin) – thankyou

Triganin-See you later

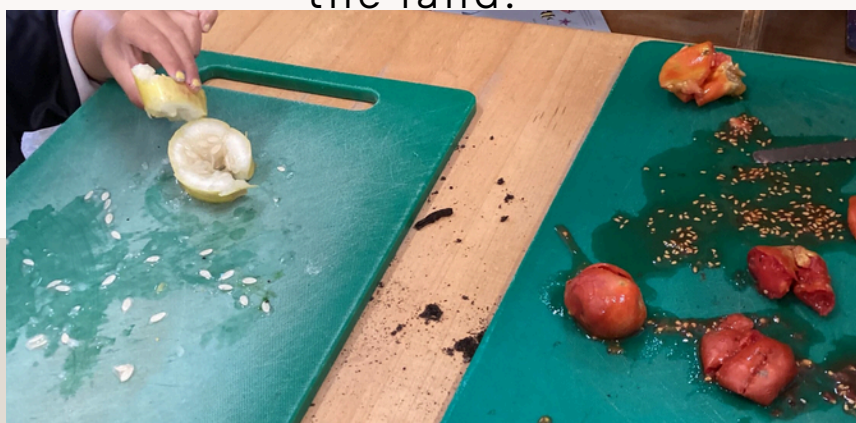
We then went to the oval and he taught us how to hold and throw a boomerang.



OUR VEGETABLE GARDEN-

Wow! So impressed with the endless learning opportunities and their joy when they discover the fruit/vegetables. They have been involved in the whole process including watering, weeding, hunting for snails and eating it in their meals. The children have learnt about what seeds need to grow/life cycle of plants as we engaged in a drama experience including the bee coming and pollinated their flowers and they grew tomatoes. This sparked curiosity and questions about what is pollen, how honey is made and the importance of bees- see their painting in the hallway. They are also sharing their awareness that seeds need soil, water and sun and emerging awareness that they also need time, space and air.

The children cut up some of the rotten tomatoes and a cucumber and have planted the seeds and hopefully they will become seedlings and be used in the new planting in our vegetable garden including broccoli which has just sprouted. Connecting with country and learning how we can be sustainable and live off the land.



RICHARD'S CURRY TUNA SLICE

INGREDIENTS:

1 Large carrot
1 large brown onion
2 stalks of celery
1 can of tuna in spring water
1 tsp curry powder
50 grams butter
¼ cup plain flour
2/12 cup milk
cooked rice

METHOD

Finely chop all vegetables finely, saute the vegetables until soft.

Add the butter melt and add flour.

Cook for a few minutes, then add curry powder.
Add milk and cook until it begins to thicken up but it is still has a slight runny consistency.

Add tuna into the mix.

Place cooked rice into a baking dish.

Add the tuna mixture and bake in the oven at 180 C for 10-15 minutes.
